Reservation Details

Morse Preserve is one of Alton's best-kept secrets. Large sections of this property were once managed as part of a commercial wild blueberry farm. Though blueberries here are no longer in commercial production, the remaining early successional habitat at Morse Preserve (old fields, shrublands, blueberry barrens, and areas of very young forest) is unique in this part of the New Hampshire. These habitat features are of critical importance for a diverse array of native wildlife including ruffed grouse, woodcock, eastern towhee, New England cottontail, and many other species of birds and small mammals. This "open" habitat provides hikers with exceptional views of the entire Belknap Range, including Mount Major and Lake Winnipesaukee, as well as excellent berry picking in

Trail Information

From the trailhead near Avery Hill Road, a network of trails, including the Adene Frances Morse Trail and the Robert A. Greenwood Sr. Loop, winds through meadows, former fields, and forests to reach the top of Pine Mountain. Enjoy the panoramic views of the lake and surrounding mountains with a picnic at the summit.

- **ROUND TRIP DISTANCE:** 1.7 mi
- **TRAIL MARKINGS**: Yellow rectangles.

Getting There/Directions

Parking for Morse Preserve is available in the lot for the Mike Burke Town Forest on Avery Hill Road in Alton Bay. Walking across Avery Hill Road from the parking lot, turn right and follow the road a short distance until you see the Forest Society property sign and gate on the opposite side of the road. A kiosk is 100' ahead.
